Headteachers are encouraged to work

collaboratively with youth work partners to develop effective plans and approaches to utilising PEF to improve educational outcomes for children and young people affected by poverty and enhance progress towards the delivery of the SAC (Scottish Attainment Challenge) mission. This includes approaches within the school and across the learning community and working together to measure impact. Investment of PEF in youth work can provide schools with the opportunity to enhance, scale or introduce new approaches to tackling the poverty-related attainment gap within the school, and across the learning community.








"Headteachers should endeavour to work in partnership with their local community partners, such as youth work and community learning and development, to develop approaches to utilising the funding to best effect".
